

Portage Library to host 'Go Big Read' discussion

The Portage Library will follow the lead of Madison Public Library who partners yearly with University of Wisconsin -Madison for "Go Big Read." This year's selection is <u>Evicted</u> by Matthew Desmond. The discussion will be Tuesday, Nov.



15 at 6:30. Two students from the School of Library and Information Science will be facilitating the discussion. Books will be available on a first-come basis at the library starting Oct. 19. Fifteen copies available for extended checkout, and a reader may also purchase a personal copy and join the discussion. According to Lynn

Harthorne, Adult Service Librari-

an, 19 other libraries in South Central Library System have also signed on for the Big Read of <u>Evicted</u> this year. The Go Big Read program is designed to have students, faculty and wider community read an academically-focused book and have a "vigorous discussion and exchanges of diverse ideas." Similar programs to encourage thoughtful discussion of important topics are the National Endowment for the Arts' *Big Read*, and *One Book* sponsored by the Library of Congress.

<u>Publishers' Weekly's</u> review stated that "gripping storytelling and meticulous research undergird this outstanding ethnographic study, in which Desmond, an associate professor of sociology at Harvard, explores the impact of eviction on poverty-stricken families in Milwaukee. Desmond conducted fieldwork by observing and asking questions...; later, he collected extensive data about eviction specifically in the private rental market. Desmond identifies affordable housing as a leading social justice issue of our time and offers concrete solutions to the crisis."

The author received his PhD from UW-Madison in 2010, and in 2015 was awarded a MacArthur "genius" grant.

Book sale big \$\$uccess Friends

Year-round planning and organizing paid off well for the Friends of the Library book sale in late July with receipts totaling \$5,335. The annual book sale is the primary fundraising activity for the organization. According to Marvin Jensen, book sale committee chair, the sale "appears to be drawing patrons from a widening area, due in part to publicity in surrounding communities, invitations to dealers, and information targeted to visitors to Portage, such as this year's Edsel convention attendees." He adds that "scheduling the sale before the county fair seemed to work well--even in the face of road construction in front of the library, a gas leak, a major storm, and shortened library hours." Next year's sale is scheduled for July 20-22 (with member's preview night on July 19). Donations for the next sale are now being accepted at the library. Arrangements for pick-up of books can be made by calling 742-7783. Over 75 volunteers helped before, during, and after the sale; 19 volunteers helped at the sorts throughout the year. The first monthly book sort for the 2017 sale will be Sept. 9, from 9-11 am, in the Bidwell Room.
