Review of goals and objectives for 2015-2020 Plan for Library Services*

- Ensure quality library programs and services for all county residents.
- Inform and advocate to the public and governing bodies the wide range of library services available to its rural residents, using a variety of public relations and marketing strategies.
- Offer assistance in using new technologies implemented to ensure quality of library services.
- Obtain equitable funding for public libraries and provide incentives for continuity in library services throughout Columbia County.

Goal: Inform and advocate to the public, and governing bodies the wide range of library services available to its rural residents using a variety of public relations and marketing strategies.

Community Partnerships:

Lodi Public Library: The Lodi Quilt Guild's 193 members donated pre-cut fabric, and assisted with quilting instruction to children and adults who created 46 kennel quilts for needy animals at the Columbia County Humane Society.

Portage Public Library: Senior living facility Heritage House welcomed children from the area for a Community Story Time, as part of the library's summer library program "Build a Better World."





Goal: Ensure quality library programs and services for all county residents. Poynette Area Public Library: 146 people were thrilled by the experiments and hands-on activities during the "Construction and Demolition! With Mad Science of Iowa" program.

Rio Community Library: Just before the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro, the Rio Library hosted their own version of the summer games. Events included kickball and horseshoe tournaments, cupcake wars, Norwegian skis, hay bale hurdles, book balance relay, trivia, gaga ball, and a very popular dunk tank. Nearly 400 local "athletes" took part in the activities, that's about 40% of Rio (WI's) population!

Goal: Offer assistance in using new technologies implemented to ensure quality of library services. I am an adjunct instructor for a private university. I teach online courses and do a great deal of communication and work on the internet for the benefit of my students. I cannot begin to express how valuable both the resources and the staff at the library have been in helping me to fulfill these responsibilities. The staff at the Poynette Library, without exception, is knowledgeable, skilled, and very competent in helping me to access the technology (internet, document scanner, and copy machine) and other resources provided by the library. Goal: Obtain equitable funding for public libraries and provide incentives for continuity in library services throughout Columbia County.

A. The County Library board will provide at least full statutory reimbursement funding to all County libraries for access by county residents in townships/villages which do not maintain a public library.

B. The Board will provide funding to county public libraries for central cost expenses, such as rotating collections, inter-library delivery service, and resource library payments.

C. The Board will provide reimbursement funding to adjacent counties for service to Columbia County residents.

Delivery Service

- 5 days per week
- 700,000 items transported per year (avg.)
- 10 libraries in our county, 76 in South Central Library System
- \$48,000 per year

Library users love this service and are frequently impressed at the speed in which their requests for items are filled. Libraries are the hearts of our communities and Delivery is the lifeblood that circulates between them.

Food for thought: Not only is this listed as a goal for our library system, most other counties in our system (Wood, Portage, Sauk, Dane, Green, etc.) pay for this service on behalf of their libraries.
