## **BUILDING MAINTENANCE**

Starting on September 10, the library will embark on a mandatory building maintenance project to update the sprinkler system. This will ensure that the library remains a safe space for both staff and patrons.

Fortunately, the children's entrance and children's area will not be affected so families will have full access to our children's play space, materials and programs. Library Director Debbie Bird explained, "Adult and teen library programs will still be offered as we look to share available library space and consider off-site program locations. Holds placed by patrons, as well as new titles, will be available for checkout. Limited computer access will also be available.

Bird noted, "Unfortunately, library staff will be unable to accommodate any community bookings in the Bidwell Room, Sanderson Room or study rooms during the period of September 10, 2019 through the new year. We apologize ahead of time for any inconvenience, but as this is an essential improvement that must be addressed, we will be as flexible as possible to continue offering great service to the community. Thank you."

Portage Library Board President Karl Kindschi explained that after a bidding process initiated by the City of Portage, The Board selected Dave Jones, Inc., of Madison, to replace the branch lines and drops for the sprinkler. A nitrogen generator needed when the sprinkler is activated will also be installed.

# FACELIFT TO THE OUTSIDE OF THE LIBRARY

In September, Edgewater Home and Garden will be planting prairie grasses, colorful hydrangeas, cone flowers and other prairie species, and additional low-maintenance greenery around the exterior of the library. Abundant rainfall this summer and the upcoming cool temperatures of autumn should provide perfect conditions for the new plantings.

In recent years, weeds had begun to take over the sidewalk and lawns, and many established plants were dead or dying. The Portage Library Board decided that new landscaping was necessary. Joel Engelland, Landscape Architect, provided the design. Klay Vehring, Portage Library Board member, spearheaded this project.

On two Saturdays this past month, volunteers weeded and prepared the grounds. The city provided dump trucks to receive and haul away the waste. Since this project is outside the regular budget, the Portage Library Foundation agreed to pick up the cost of the new plantings. As a result, attractive, low-maintenance flowers and shrubs will combine with areas of lawn in the environmentally-friendly plantings.

Library staff is grateful for the commitments made throughout the city to beautify the grounds and maintain the attractive appearance of the library inside and out.

### INTRODUCING DEBBIE BIRD



A veteran librarian with 25 years of experience in SCLS, Debbie came this July to become Portage Library Director.

"She's so energetic," commented Library Board Presiden Karl Kindschi. He noted her ability to prioritize and her desire for outreach at a time of "all sorts of growth" in the services.

Director Bird so far has identified the following goals: increase circulation, identify the needs of the community, acquire added resources needed to be relevant, and provide outreach to the City of Portage and Columbia County government, The Daily Register and local businesses and organizations.

For the past 20 years, Bird served at the Sun Prairie Library, most recently as Head of Technical Services. Besides cataloging and supervising tasks related to processing, shelving and acquisitions Debbie managed library pages and coordinated the assignments of nearly 140 volunteers.

#### NEW ADULT SERVICES DIRECTOR





### SUMMER READING PROGRAM A SUCCESS!

"Summer slide" refers to the loss of learning that takes place among students when school isn't in session. That loss means skills need to be retaught, costing an estimated \$1,500 per student. Over the course of a K-12 education, that can equate to more than \$18,000 per student, according to a recent post on http:// www.idtech.com.


Research indicates that children lose an average of two months of reading skills and 2 1/2 months of math skills over a single summer. Plus, summer slide is cummulative, so those lost months add up over time.

For this year's summer Library Program, Portage Public Library signed up 565 library users of all ages. Eighty-eight adult registrants completed 1,800 reading hours; 119 teens completed 2,951 reading hours; and 172 children birth through kindergarten and 186 1st through 5th graders registered.

Since January, 2019 programming has reached 3,105 library users.
