## A bounty of new resources awaits you at library

To update the adult nonfiction collection, acquisitions have focused on several specific areas, according to Adult Services Director Lynn Harthorne. She specifically mentioned purchases in family life and parenting. She noted that PCL now subscribes to two wedding magazines for first time. Titles for science are being considered, though Harthorne noted that the breadth of that subject means that acquisitions must be thoroughly considered and will be gradual. Youth Services Director Amanda Pardo pointed out purchases in YA social studies categories, specifically in African-American history. She commented on the intense interest of YA readers in new fiction, which she finds exciting because the offerings are "constantly changing."






## Discarding: Out with the old, in with the new

"All libraries discard books, and it is part of the life cycle of a book and of a library collection," explained Portage Library Director Jessica Bergin. She likened the process to the one we use at home with our own clothes closets, and cited the need for display space as one of the primary concerns.

Among the reasons for discarding a books are that

- It is in poor condition
- It contains inaccurate or outdated information
- It is no longer checked out, and/or
- It doesn't qualify for addition to the historical or other special collections.



Bergin noted that the library adds dozens ("sometimes hundreds!") of new books each month, and we need to find space for them.


"Shelves that are stuffed full compress books and damage them," she explained. "Besides, it is visually easier to browse a shelf that is not completely full, and space on a shelf allows us to display books face-out, which is known to improve circulation."

She noted that many recent discards have come from the adult non-fiction collection, which the staff is working to develop and update. "We're playing catch up there," she commented about the effort to make nonfiction offerings more relevant.

Items discarded from the library are stored by the Friends and are available at bargain prices at the book sales held occasionally during the year but primarily at the main book sale held each July. Offerings will be available this year July 19-22.

Join the circle of Sci-fi readers

Three more science fiction books will be dissected and discussed at upcoming book discussions. On March 6 Ray Bradbury’s classic Fahrenheit 451 is on the agenda, followed by I Robot on April 3, and Stranger in a Strange Land on May 8. Each book discussion gathering starts at 6 pm in the Bidwell Room at the library. Copies of each of the books will be available at the circulation desk one month prior to the discussion.



.... Or solve a good mystery

The Mystery Lovers book club has three books lined up for discussion in the near future. On March 14, they will be talking about Donald Westlake’s Money for Nothing, and on April 11 The Hemingway Thief by Shaun Harris will be under the microscope. The final book on the agenda for spring reading is The Magician’s Lie by Greer Macallister.

Library signage gets updates

According to Adult Services Director Lynn Harthorne, there's been reorganization and "lots of relabeling" in media areas. On the west end of the Adult Library proper, CDs are displayed in new, accessible towers. Movies are housed alphabetically in one set of shelves on the main floor, while audio-books are housed in another set of shelves. More specific classification of vocal and instrumental CDs has been provided. Patrons can now browse through categories including Blues/Jazz; Bluegrass/Folk; Classical Contemporary Christian. New Age, Rap/Hip Hop/R & B, Soundtracks/Musicals.




New signage at the library includes one reminding library users to NOT use the space set aside for teens, and the sign (below) clearly indicating “family friendly” library materials.
